From Uncle Sam's Viewpoint

If you're reading this (I'm assuming an early January delivery date), I'd guess it's safe to say the world didn't end at midnight December 31, 1999! The preachers of "doom and gloom" may not be eating crow (they'll just claim to have a new kernel of wisdom about when the end's really coming), but we can be content in the knowledge that they surely will be eating that six-month supply of C-Rations they purchased beforehand (anybody wanna' buy some cheap camping supplies?)

But what if?

What if the Y2K nuts had been right and many forms of electronic communications had failed? Amateur radio operators would've suddenly been the objects of adoration. Heroes of communication! How many other wireless or telecommunications service can you think of with the ability to communicate nationwide (and worldwide under the right circumstances) without much

more than a radio, a length of wire, and a car battery? But—canyou?

Is your station ready to run, should the power fail? Now I don't mean that you gotta' have a battery sitting under your shack desk, but do you have access to one (or a generator) quickly? Do you have a mobile or portable station permanently set up? If your antenna is taken out in a severe storm, do you have a spare wire antenna that you can erect with little dely? Being a member of SATERN, SKYWARN, ARES, or RACES may be a step in the right direction, but membership and training alone will not put your station back on the air when it's needed most-preparation will. The fact that so many Amateurs are prepared to, and have proven themselves in past emergencies is, I believe, one of themajor reasons our radio spectrum has withstood repeated assaults from commercial interests over the years.

In years past (especially during WWI, II and the Korean War), the Amateur Radio Service was much more valuable to the Federal government, not as a source of frequency-auction funds as now, but as a source of knowledge in emerging technologies (radio & electronics) and as a source of experienced radio operators. I wonder sometimes, after monitoring much of the spectrum we as Hams enjoy today—can theypossibly still see us in that same light? Are we really on top of the latest technology or are we clinging to the past? How many of us have a real grip on radio & electronic technology at all? While we as hams visualize Amateur Radio as a national treasure, a resource to conserve and nourish, in the final equation, it will be how the government views us that will decide whether or not our spectrum winds up on the auction block. How do we wish to be viewed? Like it or not, Uncle Sam is watching!

Repeater Courtesies—"Do You Hear What I Hear?"

While still on my soapbox, I want to validate the authenticity of a statement recently heard. The FCC made a comment on the concern of hams using their "abbreviated" call sign.

The jest of it is, from Riley Hollingsworth (FCC Special Counsel for Amateur Radio Enforcement), "identifying only by the last two letters of an Amateur call sign is a violation of Part 97." Also, to be strictly legal, stations using a suffix-letter ID always must identify within the first 10 minutes of the communication (and each 10 minutes thereafter) with a complete call sign.

I (personally) would never break into (interrupt) a QSO with "OEF." My call sign is K80EF—and proud of it since 1958.

Is your call sign too long? Or you don't like your call sign? Or embarrassed (ashamed) with your call sign? Go BUY ONE (vanity) that suits you.

And in closing as with most operating tips—and it's a shame—people who should read-and-heed this, or read and don't care—or worse yet, they're not USECA members (free loaders), and consequently don't read the award-winning *Express* with these operating tips.

Boy! Are they missing a great thing—but who's going to tell them?

Off my soapbox—I'll close with a happy note to each one of you, the true fans of the *Express:* "A most joyous and happy new millennium. I wish I could be here to wish you the same for the next one."

Notice to the USECA Fleet

As I would guess most of you know, a while back, the FCC did away with the ship's station license requirement for Marine VHF radios on pleasure craft less than 60'. (Ater 1st trying to raise the cost of the license to over \$150!) Canada followed suit shortly thereafter, in much the same fashion, as regards licensing of pleasure vessels. US and Canadian Commercial vessels

and those vessels carrying SSB Marine HF radios are still required to hold a station licens@nd a licensed operator (Marine Restricted Operator's Permit a.k.a. MROP). Until recently an MROP was required of any US vessel wishing to legally operate their VHF Marine radio in Canadian waters (or other foreign waters). Unbeknownst to many, Industry Canada (Canada's

version of the FCC) and the FCC, last March, reached an historic agreement to iron out the differences in our Marine radio requirements. Since March '99 it has been no longer necessary for pleasure craft of either country, operating in bordering waters, to have a station license for Marine VHF operation.

Amateur Radio Spectrum Protection Act of 1999 Introduced

A new bill to protect Amateur Radio spectrum has been introduced in the House of Representatives by Congressman Michael Bilirakis, a Florida Republican. Titled "The Amateur Radio Spectrum Protection Act of 1999," HR 783 would amend the Communications Act to require the FCC to provide "equivalent replacement spectrum" to Amateur

Radio and the Amateur Satellite Service in the event of a reallocation of primary amateur allocations, any reduction in secondary amateur allocations, or "additional allocations within such bands that would substantially reduce the utility thereof" to amateurs. Representative Bilirakis was interested in helping the Amateur Radio community in recognition of the fine performance of amateur emergency communicators after several recent hurricanes in his state, and especially Hurricane Andrew.

U.S. hams are urged to write their members of Congress in support of this bill.

When The FCC Comes Knocking

(Much of this comes from the FCC website—the italics, underlines, and comments are mine.)

The Federal Communications Commission has the authority to inspect most radio installations. Responsibility for conducting these inspections generally rests with the Enforcement Bureau's Field Agents. In the course of fulfilling this responsibility, the Agents often receive questions concerning the authority and procedure under which they are working. Below are a few of the ones asked most often.

INSPECTION AUTHORITY

Both licensees and non-licensees MUST allow an FCC Agent to inspect their radio equipment. Along with the privilege of possessing a license come responsibilities such as knowing the applicable rules, including allowing the station to be inspected. Licensees should be aware of the Commission's right to inspect. Equally important, FCC Agents are allowed to inspect the radio equipment of *non-licensees*. Nonlicensees include those individuals or entities operating in accordance with Part 15 of the Rules. Non-licensees also include those who should have a license to operate their equipment but have not obtained a license and are operating without authority.

FAQ's

Q: Why must operators of radio frequency devices allow the FCC to inspect their equipment?

A: The Commission must ascertain essential facts pertaining to the operation of a station which may be vital to the resolution of a number of questions, including interference problems involving public safety. For this reason, the FCC must be able to check all covered equipment that have the *potential* to emit radio frequencies. Section 303(n) of the Communications Act gives the FCC this authority.

Q: What happens if I do <u>not</u> allow the FCC agent to inspect my equipment?

A: Failure to allow inspection forecloses the opportunity to resolve the problem. Thus, refusal to allow inspection is a serious challenge to the Commission's authority to inspect radio stations and is a violation of the Rules. Such a refusal may lead to revocation of a license, maximum monetary forfeiture, or other Commission sanctions.

Q: The FCC Agent standing at my door does not have a search warrant, so I don't have to let him in, right?

A: Wrong. Search warrants are needed for entry involving criminal matters. One of the requirements as a licensee, or subject non-licensee to the Commission's Rules, is to allow inspection of your radio equipment by FCC personnel. Whether you operate an amateur station or any other radio device, your authorization from the Commission comes with the obligation to allow inspection. Even radio stations licensed under a "blanket" rule or approval, such as Citizen's Band (CB) Radio, are subject to the Commission's inspection requirement.

Q: Well then, if I am a low-power broadcaster and don't have an FCC license, they need a search warrant, right?

A: <u>Wrong again</u>. The FCC agents have the authority to inspect *all* radio equipment; even if you do not have a license, the FCC can still inspect your equipment. Section 303(n) of the Act gives the FCC the right to inspect all "stations required to be licensed." This language covers your low-power radio station. The FCC agents are inspecting the equipment, not searching your house.

Q: Okay, I understand now why the Agent doesn't need a search warrant, but how do I know what the Agent will do next?

A: Once you open the door, the agents should show their FCC identification card and badge, identify themselves by name and agency, and should state the purpose of the visit. They then should request permission to inspect the radio station. The agents may also ask to see records such as licenses for the station or operator. Agents, however, should never open private cabinets, drawers, or other private items in the search for license documents.

Q: Can the agents come to my residence at any hour of the day or night to conduct an inspection?

A: FCC Agents inspect during the hours of operation. If you are operating your station during late or unusual hours you cannot use the time element as justification for refusing to permit an inspection at that time. You <u>cannot</u> avoid an inspection by electing to operate only during late or unusual hours.

Q: The FCC Agent said that I had to allow inspection of my radio station without unnecessary delay. What does "without unnecessary delay" mean?

A: Immediate on-the-spot inspections are *generally* necessary. In most cases, any delay can result in changed conditions of the transmitting equipment or its operation, adversely affecting the efficacy of the inspections. For that reason, Agents cannot return at a later time to accommodate the operator, cannot wait for the operator to make any adjustments to the equipment, and cannot spend time repeating the reasons for the inspection.

Q: Why don't the FCC's agents have to make an appointment with me to inspect my equipment?

A: The Commission has no means of determining whether a station is being operated as licensed except through immediate on-the-spot inspection. To establish the amount of operating power of a station, the input power of the last radio stage of the transmitter must be actually measured with test equipment. To delay an inspection for the convenience of a licensee would allow the licensee time in which to modify or restore the transmitter to its licensed condition, thus permitting the licensee to avoid detection. This same theory also applies in the case of whether a station is operating with an unapproved type of transmitter.

Q: What can happen to me if the agent determines that I am using illegal or unauthorized equipment?

A: There are several different ways that this situation can be handled. You *may* volunteer to surrender the equipment to the agent who will then destroy it under FCC procedure. If you choose not to surrender the equipment, the FCC can bring a proceeding against you to take the equipment. This is known as an in rem (i.e., property) forfeiture proceeding. Additionally, if you choose not to surrender the equipment, you can be issued a civil monetary forfeiture penalty. See 1997 Forfeiture Policy Statement 12 FCC Rcd 17087(1997).

Q: Am I required to surrender any illegal or unauthorized equipment to the agent?



A: No, <u>surrender is voluntary</u>. However, it is the <u>best</u> way to avoid a large monetary forfeiture.

Q: Is the inspection procedure for various services different? Is the procedure different for licensees and non-licensees?

A: The inspection procedure is essentially the same for all of the services. Similarly, the inspection procedure is the same for licensed and non-licensed stations. This is because the FCC has the right to inspect <u>ALL</u> covered radio equipment.

Q: Can I have my attorney present during the inspection? Can I make the agent wait to start the inspection until my attorney is present?

A: You may have your attorney present during the inspection; however, there is no constitutional right to have your attorney present. Therefore, you may not make the agent wait until your attorney arrives. Making the agent wait for your attorney conflicts with the "unnecessary delay" requirement discussed earlier.
